Copiepresse – Google

In the case brought by press consortium Copiepresse, Google has been ordered to remove the material and pay a fine of \$32,500 a day

MBL – Meltwater

Norwegian publishers were awarded compensation of NOK 3,750,000 (c. £370,000), in addition to receiving its legal costs in relation to Meltwater indexing Norwegian newspapers.

Google- La Martiniere

PARIS (AP) — A Paris court has ruled that Google's expansion into digital books breaks France's copyright laws, and a judge slapped the Internet search leader with a \$14,300-a-day fine until it stops showing literary snippets.

Copying of just 11 words of a news article can be copyright infringement, the European Court of Justice (ECJ) has ruled. Europe's highest court has said that a clippings service's copying could be unlawful.
